Course Description:

This is a survey course in Anglican theology that will involve extensive reading and regular analysis and writing. Using the lens of the *Book of Common Prayer* (BCP) as a way of approaching the general trajectory of Anglican theological thinking, this course will survey some of the developmental sweep of Anglican (mostly English) theological reflection based on the BCP, and, more importantly, will focus in on particular parts of the BCP itself for theological analysis. Beginning with Wycliffe and Tyndale, the course will move through a number of writers into the early 21st century.

The reflection paper will be due at the time of the final content quiz.

You will also be required, by the college, to complete the online course evaluation that will be sent to you via email towards the end of the course.

Late work

Course Format:

Hybrid Delivery:

The format of this course is a little bit odd. Because of some scheduling issues, Ephraim Radner will not be present for the course, though we will be using his lectures and assigned reading as the basis for our time together. David Alenskis will be the in-person lead for the course, and Cole Hartin will be the lead for the students joining remotely. Between the two of us, we will be facilitating the discussion around the pre-recorded lectures, marking assignments, and providing support to students.

The same expectations for student engagement and participation which apply to in-class learning also apply to remote or synchronous learning situations. Students who log into the Zoom site but do not contribute during discussion times and are not visible through live video will not be counted as participating in the class.

Weekly Delivery Outline:

- 1. All reading material and other resources will be available online on <u>Quercus</u>, and it will be the students' responsibility to read/view material *before* each common session.
- 2. Online pre-recorded weekly video lectures by Ephraim Radner each approximately 1.5 hours, broken into three sections will be available to students. Students will be required to listen to/view these lectures asynchronously before the scheduled class. Written texts of the lectures will also be made available.
- 3. There may be a few other short videos to watch as well, whose URLs will be provided.
- 4. Written answers to questions on the weekly readings will be required.
- 5. Each class will meet in-person and remote by zoom at the scheduled time, for 60–90 minutes or more (within the allotted class time). You will be expected to compose three questions for the discussion, based on readings and lecture, to be submitted the day before the class.
