COURSE DESCRIPTION

Is it legitimate to use technology to communicate the gospel? This course examines the function and use of the tools of technology in the varied ministry of the church. It asks critical questions about technology and its use. In the context of addressing issues such as virtual community, media arts and worship, internet-based ministry, Christian education and youth ministry, and spirituality online, it seeks to equip students with discernment in this new area of ministry.

ASSIGNMENTS

1. Participation in the discussion forums (value: 4 x 10%=40%).
2. Choice of doing either the two short assignments (value: 2 x 20%=40%) OR a major project/paper (value: 40%).
3. Biblical Verses Exercise (value: 20%).

Further details for each are as follows:

1. Discussion Forums

Value: 40% (10% per forum)

Students will participate in 4 discussion forums based on an issue, problem, or case. You will be divided into groups with 4 or 5 members and assigned a specific topic. Each forum will last two weeks. The first week of each forum will be devoted to discussing the topic as a group; while the second week will be taken up with drafting and circulating the forum paper for submission. Everyone should post an initial response of about 250 words (do this early in the week) and make a least one response to one other member's post. Full instructions will be given. Everyone is expected to read the "Forum Guidelines" available on the course site. The topics for the 4 discussion forums are as follows: [NOTE: These topics may change by the start date of the course.]

•Forum 1 (Weeks 1 and 2)

Forum topic will be assigned from among the following options:

- How would you define technology? Are there ways in which technology defines you? (C. Detweiler, *iGods*, 43).
- "Where shall we express our hopes and fears? If we post our concerns on Facebook, we may forget to cast our cares on the Lord, the one who sustains us in our sorrows." (C. Detweiler, *iGods*, 5).
- According to Marshall McLuhan (*The Gutenberg Galaxy* (1962), technology is never neutral. Do you agree or disagree with this contention? What examples can you cite from religion or spirituality in support your point of view? Is the pervasiveness of technology in modern life attributable to the decline in the influence of religion? Or stated differently is technology a new religion that allows us to make sense of the world?
- "The WWW [World Wide Web] is miraculous. It is theological creativity in action." (Ralph Abraham).

•Forum 2 (Weeks 4 & 5)

Forum topic will be assigned from among the following options:

- "A church is the only organization that exists primarily for the benefit of non-members" (W. Temple). How does this apply to online evangelism?
- Is the issue of boredom and the lack sincere worship due to either: (1) the increasing use of multimedia in worship reflects a general boredom with existing, traditional forms of worship; or (2) the importation into worship of media and technology used in the mainstream media?

- “Surely high-tech equipment like digital video, PowerPoint and musical synthesizers can help worshipers to dance and mourn. But why do we want them? Why do we feel that we need them? Maybe we’re getting increasingly bored in worship because of all the fancy techniques used by the mainstream media. We expect and even demand the same level of spectacle. If so, what should we expect to see during real worship?” Ronald A. Johnson.

•Forum 3 (Weeks 7& 8)

- “As the world adjusts to the new reality that technology provides, many traditions and taboos surrounding meeting and mating are on their way out, and more likely will fall, replaced by whichever new theories of relationship happiness win out in a marketplace of possibilities that never in history has been so vast.” D. Slater, *Love in a Time of Algorithms* (New York, 2013), 224.

•Forum 4 (Weeks 10 and 11)

Forum topic will be assigned from among the following options:

- “Wherever we see the Word of God purely preached and heard, and the sacraments administered according to Christ’s institution, there, it is not to be doubted, a church of God exists.” (J. Calvin, *Institutes*, IV, I, 9). Can this assertion by Calvin be legitimately applied to the online church?
- “The online church fulfills the functional definition of church as the intersection of community, worship and mission.” (Robert Warren). Agree or disagree?

2. Short Assignment

There are two short assignments value: 20% each. Whatever choices you make the due dates are:

Short assignment I: 26 Jan. 2018.

Short assignment II: 16 Feb. 2017.

The purpose of these assignments is to give you the opportunity to develop your understanding of the technology and ministry in new ways. In other words, they are intended to stretch and challenge you. Thus, for example, if you have already had experience of doing a sermon using power point, don’t choose that option here. Do something new. That applies to the other choices as well. If you have difficulty deciding, please be in touch with me for advice.

Choose from any two of the following categories: [NOTE: Websites/links will be active on the course website]

1. Chat Exercise This has two stages:

a. Christian Chat. Define your spiritual type at Beliefnet by completing the 25-question quiz. Then join in one of the discussion groups and talk about your findings (see questions under b. below).

b. Chat for Christ. Logon to ChristianChat. Enter one of the chat rooms on the site. Participate in some discussion. Log on to some different types of chat rooms. Here are some to try: Patriot, Strike, Circanet Listen in to the conversation. Then try entering into discussion!

For a. or b. answer these questions:

- What were your reactions and those of the participants?
- What sort of person is most likely to be suited to chat room ministry?
- How does it vary according to the type of user?
- Why is a combative spirit counter-productive to effective witness?
- What might be the benefits of such an online chat?
- What would the drawbacks be?

Point out potential dangers in chat room witness. Could your church train people for chat witness? In response to these questions, record your impressions, think critically about the experience, and write a report (1200 words or 4 pages double spaced), and send it to me as an attachment.

2. Testimonies There are two choices in this assignment:

a. Visit PowertoChange or Stonewall Revisited. Read the testimonies on these sites. Evaluate whether these personal stories are effective bridges to the Internet generation. Record your impressions, think critically about the experience, and write a report (1200 words or 4 pages double spaced), and send it to me as an attachment.

b. Read the testimony-writing tutorial. Then write your testimony (1200 words, 4 pages double spaced), avoiding all jargon and elements which are not appropriate for non-Christians. Send it to me as an attachment.

3. General Website Evaluation.

Key to this exercise is to put yourself in the mind of a site visitor who is not a Christian. Search online, and locate and evaluate two websites based on the evaluative criteria. Ideally, you should locate and evaluate two sites: one that fulfils the criteria for an effective website; the other, one that is deficient in this respect. You can evaluate two websites on the same topic if you like. Ideally they should be on different topics. Some sites are suggested, but check out others for yourself. Use the checklist as the basis for your evaluation.

Use the evaluative criteria (in terms of the Dos and Don'ts) and the checklist as the basis on which to structure your evaluation. Key to this exercise is to put yourself in the mind of a site visitor who is not a Christian. Analyze both content and design. Compare the different approaches used. Submit the report to me as an attachment.

5. Online Church.

Write a critical report (1200 words, 4 pages, double-spaced) on your impressions and experience. This can be general or (preferably) on a particular aspect of the online church (e.g. worship, sermons, sacraments, pastoral provision, etc). Send to me as an attachment.

6. Article Critique.

Read the article entitled: "The Sacred and the Virtual: Religion in Multi-User Virtual Reality". Provide a critique of the article by answering the question: Is the cyber-worship discussed by the authors a viable alternative to "real" church?

Write a report (1200 words or about 4 pages double spaced), and send it to me as an attachment.

7. Newsletter.

Very few evangelistic websites have a newsletter which is designed for non-Christians. Sample the following sites:

Subscribe by email to one or all of these to see the approaches they use. Then write a report 5 (1200 words or 4 pages double spaced) on your impressions and experience. Send to me as an attachment.

8. Online Prayer Ministry.

Create an account and complete an application at the Mentor Center (<http://truthmedia.com/thementorcenter/what-is-tmc>). Before doing so view the introductory video: (<http://truthmedia.com/thementorcenter/introvideo>). You will receive online training in online ministry. It is secure and easy to use. No special skills are required. The easiest way to get started is to become a mentor yourself. Mentors choose the types of questions they want to answer and how many emails they want to receive. Once you have gained some experience, write a critical report on the training and the general experience of online prayer ministry.

9. Giving 30 minutes for Jesus.

Sign up at <http://www.give30minutes.com> and agree to give 30 minutes to chat about Jesus on the Internet or to give 30 minutes to pray for those who are chatting. The week is divided into 3 thirty minute sections and you are asked to commit to giving 30 minutes a week at a time of your choosing. The goal is to fill all of the slots so that there is someone witnessing in a chat room (of their choice) 24 hours a day, 7 days a week and someone is praying for them while they do. Keep a journal of your experience and write a report of this ministry.

10. Presentation.

Create a Power Point presentation on any aspect relevant to your church ministry. The presentation is to be made to the vestry/church council/eldership of your church for decision. Be imaginative! Here are some examples:

- Adult Education: A Vision
- Children's Ministry: A Vision
- Outreach to our Neighbourhood
- Youth Involvement in our Church
- Media in Worship
- Spirituality Resources Online
- Evangelism
- Church computer club

· Topic of your choice. It must have my final approval. As well as text and graphics you must incorporate audio and video clips. Length: Will vary with topic.

11. Sermon.

Write a sermon for presentation using PowerPoint for which you include hyperlinks to Scripture, images, video and audio clips etc. This may be one developed for another course but presented differently 6 or one written from scratch for the purposes of this assignment. The equivalent text should not be more than 10 pages. Submit the slides, audio/video, and the text of the sermon.

12. Website Development.

Research and create a basic website in some area of ministry. Develop it according to the principles and best practices we have discussed. These will be used as the basis of the marking scheme for your submission. It should be for outreach to the Christian or non-Christian community. It should be a website that shows a Christian engagement with issues like: cults, body modification, sex, movies, music, supernatural, computers, cyberculture, science fiction, horoscopes, or spirituality. Submit it to me as an attachment.

13. Technological Integration.

Write a report assessing the potential for integrating technology into the church setting where you currently are. If it already exists, then do a critical evaluation. If it does not yet exist, then draw up a plan for its implementation. Use the criteria we have reviewed from Schultze.

14. Gaming.

Sign up for a virtual game (e.g. Ultima Online, EverQuest) where you will have to create a character (avatar). Write a critical report on your experience incorporating the critiques listed in the course unit.

3. Major Paper/Project.

Value: 40%

Here you have choices:

- (a) An extended treatment of some issue that arises in the four forums.
- (b) A topic of your own (please submit to me for approval)
- (c) An extended treatment of some of the issues treated in the course units.

Whatever the topic, you need to submit a paper proposal and outline (1 page minimum) with beginning bibliography.

Length: 12 pages (single spacing) or 8-10,000 words.

Due Date: i. Outline/Bibliography: 2 Mar. 2018.

ii. Final Paper: 30 Mar. 2018.

4. Biblical Verses Exercise.

Due Date: 13 Apr. 2018.

Value: 20%.

Compile a list of 10 verses or passages from Scripture that are pertinent to a Christian understanding of the nature and use of technology. For each provide the following:

- i. The Scriptural reference to the verse/passage e.g. Luke 5: 37-38, but not the full text.
- ii. Short (paragraph length) commentary on the meaning and significance of the verse(s) or passage for our understanding of technology in a Christian context.

ASSIGNMENT SUBMISSION FORMAT

For each assignment follows this procedure:

Name the document with your initials and the abbreviation for the particular assignment: e.g. tpsa1, where “tp” is Thomas Power and “sa1” is Short Assignment 1.

Put this also in the subject line of the email that you are sending the assignment to me as an attachment. Similarly for the other assignments: for example, “tpsa2” (Short Assignment 2), “tpmp” (Major Project), and “tpbv” (Biblical Verses exercise).

For the Discussion Forum group papers, the format is, for example, “df1gp2” where “df1” is Discussion Forum 1, and “gp2” is Group2, etc. All this depends on the number of groups that materialize.

This procedure is designed to facilitate the identification, grading, and timely return of assignments, and hence it is in the interest of the student to follow it. Submissions that do not follow this format will be returned with a request to re-submit in the correct format. In such cases marks will be deducted for late submission at the rate of 1% per day, where applicable.
